

Australia has announced that koalas are now listed as an endangered species across most of its east coast, after a huge drop in numbers. The country's environment minister, Sussan Ley, said that koalas, which had been listed as being vulnerable, would now be listed as endangered in the states of New South Wales, Queensland, and the Australian Capital Territory. Scientists have been warning for many years that the native marsupial's habitats were being hit by drought, bushfires, and land development.

# Read through the information found below about the situation with koalas in Australia

Australia has lost about 30% of its koala population over the past three years, according to the Australian Koala Foundation, with the worst figures seen in New South Wales, where numbers have dropped by 41%.

## Why have koalas become endangered?

Australia has listed koalas as an endangered species across most of its east coast.

The country's environment minister said that koalas, which had been listed as being vulnerable, would now be listed as endangered. Australia's biggest koala conservation group says that there may now be as few as 50,000 of the animals left in the wild.

Recent droughts, heatwaves and bushfires have all been blamed for the declining wild koala population in Australia, as have disease and habitat loss.



#### What is being done to help?

To help protect koalas, the Australian government has announced that it will be spending \$50m (£26m) to improve the protection and recovery of the koala.

Also, this change in status means greater priority will be given to their conservation. Australia's environment minister, Sussan Ley, said that efforts were already underway to preserve koalas' habitats. She said officials were designing a recovery plan, and land development applications would now be assessed for impacts on the species.

#### Will it be enough?

Conservationists believe that more needs to be done to protect the animals. Stuart Blanch from WWF Australia said, "Koalas have gone from no-listing to vulnerable to endangered within a decade. Today's decision is welcome, but it won't stop koalas from sliding towards extinction unless it's accompanied by stronger laws."

#### Koalas

Koalas are mostly found in eucalyptus forests of eastern Australia. Their strong, clawed feet are perfect for living in the branches of trees. They eat the eucalyptus leaves from the trees and can devour up to 1kg of leaves per day! When koalas are not feasting on leaves, they don't have much energy so spend up to 22 hours per day dozing in the branches.




Baby koalas are called joeys. As soon as they are born, they crawl into their mother's pouch and stay there for about six months.

#### Did you know?

The name "koala" is derived from the Dharug word "gula" or "gulamany" meaning "no drink". It is believed that this is because koalas get almost all of their moisture from the leaves they eat and rarely drink.

Deputy head teacher, Nicky Bolton, said, "We knew the frog had travelled from West Africa because wrapping was stamped with Ivory Coast. The children were so excited to learn about the frog's journey and how it has travelled almost 5,000 miles to arrive in Wirral. The children are now very excited to find out what species he is."

### Cousins forge blacksmith business

Ilie and Harvey Roberts, who are aged 14 and 13, are Britain's youngest blacksmiths! They set up their own metal work business, O&H Metalwork Designs, during lockdown. They and their relatives are very proud that they are the 7th generation of welders in their family. "A long, long time ago, 1804, our family bought the Wrexham smithy and started doing blacksmithing," Harvey said. "Our grandad did it and we found it really interesting. We had a go, and then we thought we've come this far, and we may as well try to make a business out of it. We had to have help at the start - it's really dangerous and there are lots of sparks." Their design ideas, which include flowers and birds, have been purchased by people in countries as far away as Indonesia, raised money for Nightingale House hospice, and a dolphin sculpture made from old spoons is set to go on display at the British Ironwork Centre. The cousins have even received letters from Buckingham Palace and 10 Downing Street congratulating them on opening their decorative metal designs business and raising money for charity.

# Make ice cream in two minutes

new countertop machine has been invented that can use pods to make ice cream in four easy, mess-free steps. The appliance aims to overhaul the frozen treats industry, making changes to how these types of products are made and stored, therefore significantly reducing emissions. The ColdSnap machine can take pods and turn them into soft-serve ice cream in 60-90 seconds. ColdSnap's single-serve aluminium pods are each roughly the size of a drinks can and deliver a variety of frozen treats; including dairy and non-dairy ice cream, frozen yogurt, frozen coffees, frozen smoothies, frozen shakes, and slushies. The frozen confections machine uses a camera, which scans the QR code on each pod as they are inserted, this gives the machine all the information it requires to make each frozen delight. Matthew Fonte was inspired to come up with the idea during a conversation with his daughters, Sierra and Fiona, who were disappointed at how time consuming and messy it was to make ice cream with a traditional at-home ice cream machine.

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
