



Robots deliver shopping

NHS workers in Milton Keynes are having their shopping delivered by robots! The NHS staff, who sometimes cannot visit the shops themselves due to the long hours that they are working, are now getting free deliveries from robots. The Starship Technologies food delivery robots can hold several bags of shopping and a crate of bottles. They travel on the pavements around the town at up to 4 miles per hour. Starship who have a fleet of 70 machines, have been operating in Milton Keynes since 2018, say that 100,000 autonomous deliveries have now been completed in the town. "Right now, we are offering free delivery to all NHS workers within the community. We want to make life a little bit easier for these people in these very, very stressful times," said Henry Harris-Burland of Starship.

Hubble Telescope stunning new birthday image

The Hubble telescope celebrated 30 years since it was launched by releasing an amazing image, the picture of nebulas NGC 2014 and NGC 2020 has been nicknamed the "Cosmic Reef" because it looks like an undersea world. Nebulas NGC 2014 and NGC 2020 are part of the Large Magellanic Cloud, a satellite galaxy of the Milky Way, around 163,000 light-years away. The giant telescope was sent into low Earth orbit in April 1990 to capture images and data of distant galaxies, planets and supermassive black holes, deep within our universe. The information gathered has been used to write thousands of scientific papers. You can see what the Hubble telescope saw on your birthday by adding your birth month and day at https://imagine.gsfc.nasa.gov/hst_bday/ you will then be shown the best photo captured on that date within the last three decades!

Yes and No because some are good at tests, but some are not good at tests and some people can't keep up with the speed.

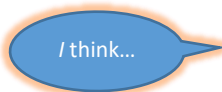
